A DEAD MAN'S CHILD.







Med Forfærdelse opdager hun, hvor hun er, og endnu større bliver hendes Rødsel, da hun hører, at Pendleton overtalte Gar el Hama til at bortføre hende til Konstantinopel, for at hun kan være i Sikkerhed. Med sin Diamantring skriver hun paa Ruden, hvad der er sket, og giver sig saa Gud i Vold i Haab og Tillid til, at hendes Køreste vil gøre alt for at frelse hende. Saa-snart Baron Sternburg erfarer, at hans Køreste er forsvundet fra Gravkamret, engagerer han straks den berømte Detektiv Newton, der beredvilligt paatager sig at opklare Mesteriet. Han faar Lejlighed til at se Gar el Hama, og genkender i ham en lange eftersøgt Forbryder, hvilket kun egger hans Lyst til at komme i Lag med ham. Og nu begynder en Kamp mellem Forbryder og Detektiv, en Kamp hvis Mage man aldrig har set i levende Billeder. Det lykkes Pendleton og Gar el Hama at slippe ind i Continent - Expressen med den stakkels Edith, og Newton naar desværre kun et komme tidsnok til at se Toget køre, men han giver ikke tabt endda. I sin Bil jager han langs med Banelinien og naar en Bro, hvorunder Toget skal passere. Hurtig som en Kat springer han op paa Broen og derfra ned paa Taget af det frembrusende Tog. Uden at Forbryderne aner den mindste Fare, gaar han ned i Toget, skifter Tøj med Konduktøren og gaar ind i Kupeen til dem. Her udspinder der sig en hæftig Kamp mellem Gar el Hama og Newton, og den ender ude paa Togets Platform, hvor de to Mænd kæmper paa Livet los, indtil det lykkes Newton med et kraftigt Stød at styrte Orientaleren ud af Toget, saa han brokker Halsen. Imedens har Konduktøren overmandet Pendleton og givet ham Haandjern paa, og han overleveres nu i Retfærdighedens Hænder for at lide sin retfortjente Straf, medens Newton fører Edith tilbage til Baronen, der glædestraalende trykker hende i sine Arme.

Le vieux comte W. est considéré pour être un homme complètement honnête. Pas plus sa fille Edith que le fiancé de celle-ci le baron Sternberg ne se doutent que la nuit par des portes et couloirs secrets il visite son bon ami et voisin l'usurier James Pendleton, qui est généralement connu pour son manque d'égards et sa brutalité. Mais unsoir le châtiment se produit. Le comte a été faire une de ses visites nocturnes habituelles et veut quitter Pendleton par l'escalier secret, mais dans l'obscurité il dégringole l'escalier et attrape une comotion cérébrale qui, peu de jours après, entraîne la mort. A son lit de mort il confie à sa chère fille qu'il les a institués, elle et son fiancé, ses légataires universelles, mais si leur union reste stérile son bon ami J.P. héritera. Mais Pendleton est une canaille, qui ne recule devant rien. Voulant bien posséder l'argent et la belle Edith il engage l'empoisonneur oriental, le docteur Gar el Hama, un très dangereux criminel, pour l'aider à commettre ses scélératesses. Le docteur oriental réussit à endormir Edith le soir même de son mariage et plus tard une nuit il trouve l'occasion de lui donner une poudre narcotique qui la fait dormir pendant quatre jours. Tout le monde , y compris le vieux médecin de la famille croit qu'elle est morte et naturellement le baron est inconsolable de la perte de sa jeune femme. Mais pendant la nuit Pendleton et Gar el Hama se glissent dans le caveau de famille et transperte Edith chez Pendleton ou Gar el Hama à l'aide de son art mystérieux la rappelle à la vie. Effrayée elle découvre où elle est, et sa terreur de vieht encore plus grande quand elle entend que Pendleton persuade Gar el Hama de la conduire à Constantinople pour la mettre en sûreté. Avec le diamant de sa bague elle écrit sur un des carreaux ce qui c'est passé et se recommande à Dieu dans l'espoir et la confiance que son mari fera tout pour la délivrer. Son espoir n'est pas déçu. Aussitôt que le baron Sternberg apprend que sa femme est disparue du caveaux il engage immédiatement le célèbre détective Newton qui se charge volontiers déclarer le mystère. Par hasard il rencontre Gar el Hama et reconnaît en lui un criminel longtemps recherché. Maintenant commence un combat entre les criminels et le détective; un combat comme on n'a jamais vu dans le cinématographe. Pendleton et G. el Hama réussissent à s'échapper avec le continent expres en emportant la pauvre Edith et Newton n'arrive malheureusement que juste pour voir partir le train. Mais il ne se donne pas pour battu. Dans son automobile il court le long de la ligne du chemin de fer et arrive à un pont sous lequel le train doit passer.
